





In May 1985 a vehicle pulled out in front of me while driving the GTO and there was a collision. The right front end was damaged. A few months later the Celica was totaled on a snowy day in the winter of 1985.

The GTO became a daily driver and was equipped with studded snow tires and I had no trouble driving in the snow. In the summer of 1986, I almost did the unthinkable. Trading the GTO in for another vehicle. At the time I had a real passion for low rider full size blazers. My mom and I went to Chevrolane on Aurora Avenue in Seattle and looked at a beautiful black lowered Blazer. I was ready to make the move until the sales guy asked, "what are you trading in?" I said "1974 GTO". His response was "who wants one of those?" Obviously, I did not trade the GTO in for the Blazer. After thinking about it I said, "I do" and the love affair with my 1974 GTO began.

Time to make some changes to the '74. I wanted Centerline wheels and new tires. A friend of mine had Centerlines on his Fairlane and they looked awesome and I had to have a set as well. However, I ended up with Enkie wheels with spinners and some new rubber from Les Schwab. It was also was time for a fresh paint job. Off to a place that would be referred to currently as MAACO. The '74 has been painted 3 times. Maaco, a shop in Auburn, and most recently at Rillos Restoration.

After the paint and added rims there were many trips to the Renton Loop, Puyallup Loop and Alki cruising and cranking Metal Church and Accept through the newly added Kenwood stereo. Many miles spent on highway 167 and at one point hitting a top speed of 115 mph. Some of the comments I used to hear were "that is not a GTO?". Is that a Nova, Omega or Buick Apollo?

My dad always had personalized license plates so I thought would get one for the GTO. I submitted three choices "RARE", "RAREGTO" and "MY74GTO". Choice #1 was taken. I received my second choice and later I realized that it was the best choice for my 1974. Now that I had a new license plate the comments changed to "I didn't realize that they made a 1974 GTO".





There were several original documents in the glove box. It included all the owner manuals, registration and a new vehicle inspection procedure dated 3/1/1974. I contacted the original owner by **calling** *information (for those who remember information)* and spoke with the lady who originally purchased the GTO from Gray Motors in Port Angeles Washington. We spoke on the phone for 10-15 minutes about the car. The one thing I still remember about



the conversation was she said she bought the car because it had a hatchback and that worked well for her golf clubs.

As time goes on and the kid's sports practices and games took over the daily activities, the GTO was driven less and stored more. During the winters it was stored under a plastic tarp at my parent's house...I know, bad choice, and I realize that now.

Fast Forward to 2007. I finally have a garage for the GTO. Decided to bring her home one winter evening. Took the tarps off. She started right up as she always has. Melinda and the kids followed me home to West Seattle from Covington and she backfired most of the way. The family said there was fire coming out of the tail pipes, but I made it without any other incidents.

From 2007-2016 the 1974 lived in the garage and was driven rarely but every time we went for a cruise, the comments were there.

Early 2016 we decided to join the Northwest GTO legends again (originally was going to join in 1998). The same year the GTOAA nationals was held in Bellevue for the annual event. We went to the event. Melinda was not feeling well with a fever, but she was a trooper knowing how much it meant to me to go. We walked around and saw some amazing cars. There was even a gold 1974 not in particularly good shape. We met Mark the "Goat Herder" and picked up a hard to find Ventura and Sprint 1971-1976 parts catalogue. Also, while chatting with Marc, it was discovered that he had a tent that was available back in 1974 for the 1974 GTO. We took his business card and left the show.











Fast forward to summer of 2018. We decided to take a trip to Dufur, Oregon (with a population of 642) to see Marc and talk about the tent. After much discussion and negotiation, we ended up leaving without the tent. His price seemed to high. We went onto our trip to Portland. After Melinda and I discussed this further, we decided we could not pass up this very rare opportunity and went back to Dufer to give him the price he wanted. We ended up driving home with an extremely hard to find new tent for our 1974.

January 2019, after nearly 35 years, it was time for a proper make over. Took her to a paint shop, Rillos Restoration in Kent on the recommendation of a friend. We picked the GTO up in October 2019 and ended up taking her back to the paint shop for a repaint due to mismatch color. We brought her home July 2020 after several back and forth deliveries trying to get it perfect. This shop normally works on Porsche's. We heard many times how "Well, you know these old cars". New exhaust has been installed as well as a new vinyl top being completed by Sunmark upholstery in Bellevue. All the chrome and aluminum parts have been re-chromed or polished at Art Brass in Seattle. I did receive a call from Darrell at Art Brass one Saturday morning saying that one of the rear window moldings got caught around the buffing wheel and was basically destroyed. I started looking for a new one...not anywhere. I thought maybe, just maybe, Marc in Dufur would have the part. And to my surprise he had the window molding for a 1974 GTO hatchback.

Marc sent one up to Seattle within the week. Marc said the glass in the hatchback he had had been broken and that is why he was able to let the parts go. Incredibly lucky! The seat covers came from Ames Performance. Just like the 1973 GTO, there are extremely limited parts at Ames for anything past a 1972

GTO. Luckily the only repop parts on the car are the drip rail moldings. Otherwise, everything is factory original.

I requested and received the documents from Pontiac Historic Services that show a GTO option cost \$322.61 and the total cost of the car was \$3858.21. The GTO was shipped to Gray Motors in Port Angeles on 2/19/1974. There were 1,036 1974 GTO Hatchbacks with an automatic built. The question is, how many with RED, RED, and black top? Then of those, how many are left? See additional photos on next page







I have always searched out any information regarding the 1974 GTO over the years, I have found and acquired the following literature regarding the 1974. *Car and Driver October 1973*, Motor Trend September 1973 (1974 GTO on the cover with the head-line,"74's Hottest Muscle Car"), Pontiac 1974 and GTO original dealership brochures "Pontiac's tough little road car".

I was online looking for 1974 GTO articles and came across the site Pontiacventura.com section 1974 page 9. (http://pontiacventura.com/1974 pontiac ventura gto 9.htm) I thought 'That car looks familiar" and low and behold it was mine. There are two photos of my car with this comment next to them "*This could be the actual car that originally re-kindled my interest in buying another Ventura (and as a bonus, starting this web-site). To protect the owner's privacy, I've wiped the plate and will not disclose the location. Are those Buick sport rims? The fact that they are perfectly lined up for the photo is just too cool! This car also has a rare vinyl top."*

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
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Washington State Car Events
